Jonathan's Story

I am a third-year missionary with Saint Paul's Outreach. We build Catholic communities on college campuses where people can encounter Christ while in college and be formed in their faith to live out and share the Gospel, the love of Christ, with the world.

Our goal is to build a community where everyone is welcome. The way we do that best is through our formation program, which helps students form their missional hearts This includes being a part of small groups, a formation community, and having a disciple. The community is built upon mission and sharing God's love that we have been so blessed to experience in community. We even say "community on mission" is one of our charism values within Saint Paul's Outreach. After all, Jesus gives us a missional call at the end of the Gospel as he tells us to go make disciples of all nations. When students are formed as missional disciples, they live out the call to build inclusive Christian communities.

The Christian life is such a joy when done with others. I find so much joy in the men I live with. It's just special to be living with others who know Christ and are striving to live out the faith well. For example, 15 of us are doing Exodus 90, an intense ascetic type of course to break free from attachments to the world. I get to live with men who are pursuing sainthood. We live in community together, all 22 of us (between two houses). We pray together, we eat together. We do morning prayer and praise and worship at 6:30 a.m. every weekday. We cook two family dinners a week and we do chores on Saturday morning. In between, we work, study, and spend time together (the youngins say "boolin" nowadays). We build a way of life together—and it is such a joy.

Community is essential to my faith because I forget how good God is sometimes. These people, my fellow disciples, remind me that the Lord is real and working among us. The Lord is faithful and SO good!

Teresa's Story

In 2023, I gratefully accepted an invitation to become a provisional board member of the **Call To Action Metro New York Chapter**. I initially surprised myself with this decision because, in many ways, my fellow board members and I are very different from one another. Could I really belong here? Yes, there are a few sons of Ireland present and a fellow caribeño representing, and, of course, what ties us together foundationally is our Catholic faith. And although, at the age of 34, I no longer consider myself young, I am definitely still "Catholic young." This is illustrated by the reality that my fellow board members are more or less twice my age.

What difference lies in a generation? The substance of a lifetime. I've read books and watched movies about Vatican II, the Bronx burning, and the AIDS crisis. Now, I sit alongside people who lived these events in real-time. I only have a few memories of life before the internet, and I became digitally literate at a young age out of necessity. On the other hand, some of my fellow board members are better reached by snail mail than by text. Some came of age during a time when they were able to pay their way through college with a part-time job and used that as a stepping stone to the kind of financial security that is useful for starting a family or buying a home. My spouse and I received our education in a different reality, one that left us with student loans we could not pay and renting in a city we could barely afford. There are even generational differences between me and the other lesbian women on the board. I don't know what it's like to keep my identity secret at work or hide my relationship from my employer. I live a life where I don't think about sexism every moment of the day only because in the decades before I was born, women like them persistently demanded to be seen by society as their whole selves, as more than the labor and value that women provide for children and men.

Love is patient; love is kind. Relating is easy; empathizing is hard. This is not a tale of older white people befriending a young brown woman or a millennial teaching the Greatest Generation or Baby Boomers proper Zoom etiquette. This is not a flattened story of us realizing that deep down, we're really the same. Love is dynamic. An affirming space is one where we love one another in and through difference—all saints, all sinners, all humanity, all joy. Any space like that is full of my kind of people; any space like that is a space I need to be. What makes working on the CTA Metro NY Board beautiful is the vast array of views, skills, and experiences we bring in service to one another, borne out of who we each are and the lives each of us have lived. It's all welcome, it's all needed—and it's all offered to God.

Dora's Story

You have now heard stories from two different speakers. Jonathan's and Theresa's stories all share their roots in love, community, acceptance of differences, and the valuing of other's stories different from our own.

Now we come to the story of each and every one of us who seeks to "build a house where love can dwell/ And all can safely live....and a place where "hearts learn to forgive."

How do we build this place? During this Feast of the Epiphany, a time when we celebrate a revelation that changed the world, let us look at our own "houses," our own hearts, our own souls. To be a welcoming community, we need to be open to being changed by others. *

Let me give you examples of epiphanies I have had that have made me more open, accepting, and loving of folks who are different from me and the ethnic and religious cultures in which I was reared.

Epiphany #1: I learned much in February 1997 and have continued learning in the ensuing years after my son came out to me. My son asked me: "Mama, do you think I would choose to be a 'leper' in our society?" That statement changed my world, and it added a new dimension to my life's mission. I wanted to make the world safe for him and for others. I wanted my LGBTQ+ students, friends, and family to know they would be safe, valued, celebrated, and honored for their gifts and their presence in our lives.

Epiphany #2: During the debates leading up to DACA**, I became more aware of undocumented students in my classes who trusted me enough to tell me their status. They were hungry for education, often working multiple part-time jobs and full-time summer jobs to pay their academic tuition and college costs. They needed—and still need—encouragement that there will be a future for them in this country.

Epiphany #3: During the Border Experience hosted by the CTA Immigration Work Group in 2018, I learned more about the asylum seekers who are full of hopes and dreams for a better life away from violence, extreme poverty, and lack of resources to earn a living. This led to supporting *The Angry Tias and Abuelas**** and Catholic Charities who help the asylum seekers.

Epiphany #4:

I also had an epiphany about my own Imposter Syndrome issues. I was born in 1953 and grew up during a time when Mexican Americans swatted with a yardstick for speaking Spanish in school. I needed to realize that we had been programmed to internalize our "inferiority." I needed to free myself of those shackles. I needed to work to gently but firmly confront racism, ethnocentrism, misogyny, sexism, and other "isms" that are still prevalent in our workplaces and places of learning.

Prayer for Epiphanies:

Let us pray that each of our lives be filled with more epiphany experiences for all of us. Although we are each unique, we all fundamentally share the same need to belong, to love and be loved, to be valued, to have a sense of purpose, and to make our days on this earth meaningful and fruitful. Alternative communities that CELEBRATE differences and EMBRACE them bring us personal growth, humble and challenge us in good ways, and support us as we work to be the hands and feet of Jesus on this one, fragile, yet resilient planet. Let us bring joy to others by truly welcoming them into our hearts and our lives. If we do that, we fulfill the Lord's prayer: Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on Earth as it is in Heaven.

Therefore, let us find or build alternative spaces for all to feel safe and loved, and comforted, and supported and where there is peace instead of hatred. For this we pray to the Lord.....May it be so...Amen.
